
II. EHS/Head Start, Migrant-Seasonal, and EHS-CCPs Programs

Head Start programs serve low-income three- and four-year-old children and their families. The purpose is to promote school readiness by enhancing the social and cognitive development of children through the provision of educational, health, nutritional, social, and cognitive development of children and families. There are eighteen grantees in Arkansas serving 5,323 children and families.

Early Head Start (EHS) programs serve low-income families with infants, toddlers, and pregnant women. The purpose of EHS is to promote healthy prenatal outcomes for pregnant women, enhance the development of very young children, and promote healthy family functioning. There are seventeen grantees in Arkansas serving 2,891 children and families.

Migrant/Seasonal Head Start Programs serve children birth to five years of age and their families. and their families. Migrant families move from one geographic location to another for agriculture work. Seasonal families work primarily in seasonal agriculture and have not moved in two years. There is one grantee in Arkansas serving 159 children and families.

Early Head Start-Child Care Partnerships (EHS-CCP) serve low-income families with infants and toddlers in a childcare setting with wraparound services from EHS. There are three grantees in Arkansas serving 584 children and families. (See attachment I)

III. HSSCO State Initiatives

In July 2024, *Arkansas Imagination Library (ARIL)* and local program partners in all seventy-five counties will celebrate a statewide milestone: More than five million Dolly Parton's Imagination Library books have been mailed to the homes of Arkansas Children, ages birth to five years. Currently, approximately 84,000 Arkansas children (46% of the state's total birth to five population) receive books each month from local program partners. The annual cost is \$26 per child. ARIL provides half of the program costs (\$13

per child per year), while the remaining \$13 per child per year is raised by local program partners. Congratulations ARIL! (See Attached Document II)

The *Arkansas Fatherhood Initiative* is still going strong as we work to complete our quarterly Powerful Conversations with fathers (PC/F) this year. We will have our last PC/F on November 12th, whereby, Kevin Carnes, President of Lakeshore Learning Materials will share the pros and cons of being a great father and grandfather.

We are still working hard to end *Homelessness* for families experiencing homelessness by getting resources and materials out to programs and continuing to make connections between Head start and the McKinney Vento Liaisons in the school districts.

The HSSCO and the Office of Early Childhood will continue to sponsor quarterly *EHS*-*CCP* Informational meetings in Arkansas based on program needs.

The *Opioid and Substance Misuse* (OSM) advisory committee continues to work hard to address substance misuse in Arkansas. We have invited all early childhood programs to join us in this fight for prevention and recovery. We have such a great state team and we have learned that we can conquer all things when we work together.

The 2024 School Readiness Summit will focus on the process for Early Childhood LEADS in Arkansas and the work that comes from the LEARNs Act.

IV. State Partnerships and Activities

EBT Summer Cards


The Summer Food Program designed for eligible Head Start children was slated for implementation in Summer 2024 and the HSSCO director was contacted to assist by reaching out to the Head Start population.

Children who are enrolled in Head Start programs are eligible for a new federal program called Summer EBT Program (Sun Bucks). Each eligible child will receive \$120 in food benefits on an electronic benefits transfer (EBT) card. The program is designed to provide additional nutrition assistance to families during the summer months when programs are not in session. This does not take place of the Summer Meal programs provided by the schools and this does not affect SNAP enrollment, children can participate in all programs.

During the school year, many children receive free or reduced lunches. However, when schools are closed for the summer, these children may face a gap in access to nutritious meals. The Summer EBT/Sun Bucks program aims to address this issue by providing eligible families with electronic benefits transfer cards that can be used just like a SNAP EBT card to purchase food.

The Department of Human Services (DHS) and the Department of Education have teamed up to ensure all eligible children receive benefits. DHS will be the agency to issue benefits and as they were reviewing the guidance, they realize that they will need access to student/parent information from children enrolled in Head Start Programs to issue the benefits. We have attached a spreadsheet for information needed on each child from each Head Start program that is not associated with a school district. Head Start programs that are part of a school district will be received by DHS through data sharing with ADE. Per FNS guidance children who attend the Head Start Program and meet age requirements are directly eligible to receive benefits. The HSSCO director contacted all EHS/Head Start programs to complete a data spreadsheet on each child and family. All spread sheets were submitted to DHS for them to receive the EBT card.

The diagram below shows a streamlined certification process and all children who would be eligible for the summer EBT program.

Joseph Laster is the assigned Program Specialist to Arkansas, Information and responses were given and things are moving forward.

OFFICE OF HEAD START (OHS)

This Notice of Proposed Rulemaking proposes new and enhanced changes to the Head Start Program Performance Standards in three principal areas: workforce support, mental health, and other quality improvements. The Office of Head Start (OHS) **announced significant changes** to the Head Start Program Performance Standards (HSPPS) that would ensure fair compensation is a key component of high-quality early care and education. These proposed changes, if enacted, would stabilize the Head Start workforce and improve the quality of the comprehensive services that Head Start families count on. They would significantly increase compensation for many Head Start staff, integrate mental health services into Head Start programming more broadly, and otherwise enhance services to help Head Start programs effectively and equitably meet the evolving needs of the communities they serve.

OFFICE OF HEAD START An Office of the Administration for Children & Families

Specifically, the proposed rule puts forward proposals for public comment that will improve wages, benefits, and job-quality for Head Start educators and other staff, as well as enhance program quality for children and families. The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking proposes changes designed to:

- Increase wages to align with preschool teachers in public school settings, to make progress toward full pay parity with elementary school teachers!
- Improve benefits for Head Start staff, including health insurance and paid leave, and enhance staff health and wellness support!
- Ensure better integration of mental health supports in program services!
- Improve child health and safety in program facilities!

- Improve family engagement services!
- Modernize the processes for programs to identify and meet community needs!

NATIONAL HEAD START ASSOCIATION (NHSA) Board

The HSSCO director serves as a Board member for NHSA. The National Head Start Association's mission is to coalesce, inspire, and support the Head Start field as a leader in early childhood development and education. We hold the belief that every child, regardless of circumstances at birth, can succeed in life.
